## A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO



Valued OIC Family and Friends,

As the season changes and we embrace the vibrant spirit of spring, we are delighted to bring you the latest edition of our newsletter. This issue is packed with exciting updates, inspiring stories, and valuable insights to help you make the most of this rejuvenating time of year.

In this issue, you will find a special feature on agency updates highlighting simple yet impactful ways to engage in our community through leadership, service, and community events.

Our community spotlight shines on our staff and partners making a positive difference in our service areas, showcasing their efforts to create a more inclusive, equitable, and compassionate society.

As an Economic Development and Career Training Agency, our programs and services are only as effective as the impact we are making across our communities. Overall, we enrolled students in over 2,000 Education and Career Services across 14 Counties. We have issued nearly 600 students a combined total of approximately \$900,000 in scholarships and tuition assistance to enroll and attain industry-recognized credentials. Internally, we have enrolled a combined total of 812 students in our Culinary Arts, Construction, Forklift, CPR, OSHA 10, Financial Literacy, Digital Literacy, and Media Entertainment Training Programs. Over 100 students participated in subsidized work opportunities, and several worked as interns. To date, we have placed over 150 individuals in living wage employment, and over 75% of them have been retained by their employers.

Our unique Community Action Agency, Education, and Career Training Model is backed by a variety of quality-of-life supportive services programs. Over the same period, we have supported 3,162 families with Energy and Utility Assistance, 2,199 families with Housing Foreclosure Assistance, and 49 unhoused veterans/veteran families secure rapid housing. Through OIC's Food Distribution Center, over 35,000 individuals received nutritional support in partnership with 14 food pantries across Yakima County.

We continue to assess our outreach efforts to ensure the community is aware of our programs and services.

We hope this newsletter inspires you to embrace the beauty of spring and embark on new adventures, both big and small. Thank you for being a part of our community, and we look forward to sharing more stories and insights with you in the coming months.

## ALUMNI STORY RICARDO

In 2019, a young man named Ricardo expressed his interest in joining our Career Services (YouthBuild). However, it was puzzling for us to understand why he wanted to participate in the program. Typically, many of the young individuals we encounter are disengaged from high school due to academic struggles and falling behind. Surprisingly, Ricardo's academic test scores were actually above grade level, and he even mentioned feeling successful in school. Another common reason for youth dropping out of school is behavioral or attitude problems, but this was not the case for Ricardo. He had never been in trouble and did not associate himself with a negative crowd or engage in any misconduct outside of school. Ricardo was intelligent, reserved, and wellmannered. So, what led him to quit school? As it turned out, he was going to be a father. Consequently, Ricardo's parents decided to impose real-world consequences on him, emphasizing that he now had a family to support. His family believed it was time for him to stop focusing on school and start working to provide.

Luckily, Ricardo's parents realized the importance of him obtaining a GED to get even an entry-level job. His parents had high hopes that it would be easy to obtain his GED before the baby's arrival. However, Ricardo's journey towards obtaining his GED was far from straightforward, as it was filled with unexpected challenges and obstacles. Despite possessing strong academic skills, Ricardo struggled with severe confidence issues that hindered his progress. It took considerable effort and months of persuasion to convince him to take his first test, which he easily passed. This initial success provided a glimmer of hope, as it seemed like Ricardo was finally on the right track toward achieving his goal.

However, the baby's birth brought about a new set of challenges for Ricardo. While it was a joyous occasion, and both the baby and mother were healthy, the responsibilities of being a 16-year-old parent proved to be overwhelming and distracting. Ricardo's focus on his GED was further tested as he navigated the demands of parenthood alongside his academic pursuits. Despite the initial setbacks, Ricardo managed to pass his second test,

marking the halfway point towards obtaining his GED. However, the reality of his situation began to sink in as the initial excitement of the baby's arrival faded. Ricardo found himself with the pressures of adulthood, all while trying to balance his academic aspirations with the responsibilities of parenting.

For the next few months, Ricardo's involvement became inconsistent for numerous reasons, hindering his progress. By the end of the 2019 cohort, Ricardo was battling with depression, anxiety, and the harsh realities of life, all while still trying to obtain his GED.

After YouthBuild, he enrolled in Secondary Education to obtain his GED. The last test he had to take was Math. From 2019-2021, OIC staff tried to keep in touch with Ricardo, providing all the support and encouragement to get Ricardo in to take the last test. The pandemic didn't make it any easier. Unfortunately, the challenges posed by the pandemic only added to the difficulty of the situation. Despite facing numerous obstacles, Ricardo managed to secure a job at a warehouse and even contracted COVID during this time. As a result, his responsibilities as a parent underwent significant changes, and his relationship with his girlfriend and her family experienced highs and lows.

However, after a long and challenging journey, Ricardo finally achieved success in the summer of 2021 by passing his math test on his very first attempt, earning his well-deserved GED. Although the process took much longer than initially anticipated, spanning two and a half years instead of the projected six months, the outcome was undeniably triumphant. Not only did Ricardo obtain his GED, but he also experienced a remarkable boost in self-esteem and confidence.
